

Flu Season

As influenza activity picks up, the American Red Cross is urging healthy donors of all blood types to give blood to ensure a strong blood supply for patients in need.

Blood and platelets can only be given by donors who are feeling well. One way to maintain health is to get a flu vaccine each fall. There is no waiting period to give blood or platelets after receiving a flu shot as long as the donor is symptom-free and fever-free.

Stay healthy this flu season and make an appointment to donate blood by downloading the free American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Donors of all blood types, especially type O, are needed this fall after hurricanes Michael and Florence forced the cancellation of about 200 blood drives, causing approximately 7,000 units of blood and platelets to go uncollected.

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass[®] to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/ RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.

Another way to support the lifesaving mission of the American Red Cross is to become a volunteer transportation specialist and deliver lifesaving blood products to local area hospitals. Volunteer transportation specialists play a very important role in ensuring an ample blood supply for patients in need by transporting blood and blood products. Purdue Earns Agreement With NSWC Crane

Purdue University Northwest (PNW), through its Center for Innovation through Visualization and Simulation (CIVS), was recently awarded a cooperative agreement from the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Crane Division (NSWC Crane) to research the ability to predict the lifespan of electronic components.

The principal investigators for PNW's proposal, CIVS Director and Professor Chenn Zhou, Ph.D. and PNW School of Engineering Professor Hansung Kim, Ph.D., said their research using 3D modeling and simulation will help to accurately predict the lifespan of a system component in its real-time environment, as well as identify specific factors for causing or accelerating its degradation.

"Accurate prediction of component functionality over time and under changing conditions—that's an objective both suited for and worthy of simulation and visualization investigative technologies," Zhou said. The cooperative agreement with NSWC Crane provides seed-funding for the university's research in close collaboration with the federal laboratory.

Dr. Alison Smith, chief engineer of Materials Analysis of Microelectronic Component Technologies within the Flight Systems Division at NSWC Crane, said, "Initiatives such as the Cooperative Agreement Program enable the NSWC Crane's Chief Technology Office to serve as a synergy generator, allowing the federal laboratory to access and benefit from university science and technology expertise, while supporting pioneering research for the benefit of the public."


Zhou said, "Research collaborations such as this provide opportunities not only to expand our fundamental understanding of physical phenomena, but also to develop widely beneficial applications."



Retired Professer Inducted into Hall of Fame

Retired Purdue University Northwest (PNW) Associate Professor Tom Mihail, Ph.D. was recently inducted into the Indiana Teacher Educator Hall of Fame by the Indiana Association of Teacher Educators.

Mihail devoted his life's work to educator preparation, specifically special educators. In his 48-year career, he worked with children, families, teachers, community members and aspiring special educators in Indiana.

"I have yet to visit a school in northwest Indiana where Tom Mihail is not revered for his deep convictions regarding social justice and serving students with diverse learning needs," said Shannon O'Brien, clinical assistant professor of Education in PNW's School of Education and Counseling.

"I had the great privilege of co-teaching with Tom for the past six years. I am better for it in every way, as I watched him lead and inspire our teacher candidates toward greatness both in the classroom and in life," O'Brien added. Purdue Joins in Fight Against Breast Cancer

Purdue University Northwest (PNW) Honors College students joined the Laini Fluellen Charities' 8th Annual "Pink Tie Affair" event at the Ameristar Casino in East Chicago recently to raise awareness and funds combating triple negative breast cancer (TNBC).

The "triple negative" form of breast cancer is diagnosed in about 10 to 20 percent of breast cancer cases and is more likely to affect younger people, in particular African Americans and Hispanics. Because TNBC typically develops in younger women before mammograms are indicated, there are fewer treatment options than other forms of breast cancer and lower survival rates.

PNW's Invisible Strings Orchestra, led by Honors College student Yamani Woody, performed during the event's social hour, setting an uplifting tone for the evening.

"Community engagement is a requirement for Honors College students and we make every effort students' to connect involvement to their academic and cultural interests," said Karen Bishop Morris, interim dean of the Honors College. "To have PNW Honors College students volunteer on behalf of the battle against triple negative breast cancer raises their awareness and cultivates their ability to advocate for issues that are

important in their lives and the communities they represent."

Bishop Morris also moderated a panel of physicians honored at the event for their contributions to breast cancer treatment. which included Kimberly Arthur, M.D., chairperson of obstetrics and gynecology at St. Catherine Hospital; Mohamad Kassar, M.D., vice chairman of medicine and director of the cancer research program at Community Hospital; Mary Nicholson, M.D., regional director of breast imaging for Community Healthcare System; and M. Nabil Shabeeb, M.D., F.A.C.S., general surgeon and founding member of the Community Cancer Research Foundation and chair of the Cancer Research Center.

According to Tranece Artis, Laini Fluellen Charities executive director, proceeds for this year's fundraiser will benefit a mammogram subsidy program for indigent patients at St. Catherine Hospital in East Chicago, TNBC research through the Community Cancer Research Foundation, and care packages for newly diagnosed breast cancer patients at three local hospitals.

"The majority of these interactions go smoothly, but you can never be sure." said Hammond Police Chief John Doughty. "That is why we have a designated area in our parking lot. This lot here at 509 Douglas street is under 24-hour video surveillance and surrounded by police 24 hours a day. The OfferUp sign

designates where to park on the east side of the building. If your purchaser or seller is not willing to meet here, there may be a reason. Stay safe and find someone else for that sale."

The safest way to avoid becoming a victim of potential fraud or theft is to conduct your transaction under video surveillance in the Hammond Police Department parking lot. It is available 24 hours a day and there to promote safe and secure transactions. We hope this will reduce the risk of fraud or theft that can sometimes accompany these transactions.
