City of Hammond Announces Governor's Parkway Overpass Project to Improve Safety and Traffic Flow

The City of Hammond, in partnership with the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT), is moving forward with the long-awaited Governor's Parkway Overpass Project—a critical infrastructure improvement designed to address longstanding safety concerns, traffic congestion, and emergency response delays caused by stalled trains in Hessville. This project, eight years in the making, marks a significant step toward improving mobility, protecting pedestrian safety, and ensuring emergency vehicles can respond without obstruction.

Public Support and Resident Input

As part of the decision-making process, the City of Hammond conducted a community survey of Hessville residents, the area most impacted by stalled trains. Results showed that over 83% of respondents believe stalled trains are a serious issue that the City should address and resolve. The City carefully evaluated five potential locations for the overpass, ultimately selecting the most cost-effective site—one that minimizes the impact on homes and businesses while maximizing benefits for the entire community.

Addressing Critical Safety Concerns

For years, stalled trains have blocked major roadways, preventing police, fire, and emergency medical services from reaching residents quickly in times of crisis. The Governor's Parkway Overpass will eliminate these dangerous delays, ensuring first responders can provide life-saving assistance without barriers. Additionally, a new pedestrian bridge will be constructed as part of the project, offering students and residents a safe, dedicated route across the tracks and reducing the risk of pedestrian injuries. Hammond Chief of Police William Short emphasized the dire consequences of these delays, recalling a moment he will never forget: "I can think of over 1,000 calls where our route was affected by stalled trains, but one in particular stays with me. We received a call from a young woman in Hessville who was being severely physically beaten in a domestic violence situation. Our officers tried three different intersections in Hessville to get to her as quickly as possible - all three intersections were blocked by stopped trains. We lost precious, life-saving time. Now if you want me to get to you, what are you willing to sacrifice?"

Chief Short underscored that this project is not just about convenience—it is a matter of public safety and the ability to protect and save lives.

Commitment to Green Space and Environmental Responsibility

The selected location for the overpass includes Briar East Woods, which has been inaccurately characterized as a nature preserve or public park. In reality, Briar East Woods has suffered from years of neglect, illegal dumping, and deterioration, making it unsuitable for designation as a nature preserve. However, the City remains committed to environmental responsibility and has implemented a 2-to-1 tree replacement plan for every tree removed during construction. This initiative will introduce 18-34 acres of new, usable green space to Hessville, enriching the community's natural landscape and expanding its tree canopy.

Hammond is home to over 340 acres of dedicated green space, including the Gibson Woods Nature Preserve, a true environmental treasure. The City's commitment to conservation and sustainability remains a priority, ensuring

that residents continue to enjoy natural spaces while benefiting from improved infrastructure.

Mayor McDermott's Commitment to a Fully Funded Solution

Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. secured 100% federal and state funding to cover the costs of the overpass and pedestrian bridge, ensuring that no local taxpayer dollars will be used for construction. "This project is a direct response to the concerns of our residents. For years, stalled trains have impacted traffic flow, delayed emergency responders, and put pedestrians at risk," said Mayor McDermott. "With full funding secured, we are delivering a solution that keeps traffic moving, protects public safety, and enhances our city's infrastructure while expanding green space for future generations."

Next Steps

Check options online via stadium websites, then look up calories at NutritionData.com so surprises like a seemingly innocent fresh-squeezed lemonade (300 calories!) won't come out of left field.

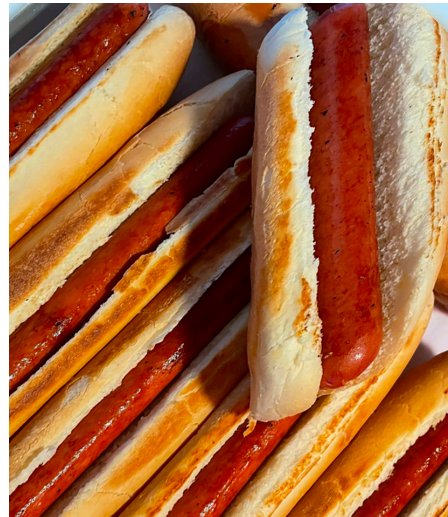
• Strike Out on Your Own

Most ballparks let you bring a 16" x 16" x 8" cooler (think two six-packs) with food and nonalcoholic drinks. If you

want beer, you'll save cash and calories by alternating it with water you've brought. And you'll stay hydrated—and keep a clear head, making for smarter snacking.

• Peanuts or Cracker Jack?

We cry foul on roasted peanuts; a cup has 863 calories. Better: boiled nuts, at 572 calories per cup and 10 times



the antioxidant flavonoids. Best: a box of Cracker Jack, with 2 grams of fat and 120 calories. Portion control, whole grains (popcorn) and a fake tattoo? Sweet!

• Sit Tight

Bypass fried temptation at the kiosks by using the new At Bat app (MLB.com; not in all parks) to have sushi, which a third of ballparks sell, delivered to your seat. Yes, you'll burn fewer calories than hiking to the counter. But you'd have to run the bases 197 times to work off impulse-buy nachos.

• Keep Your Payroll Low

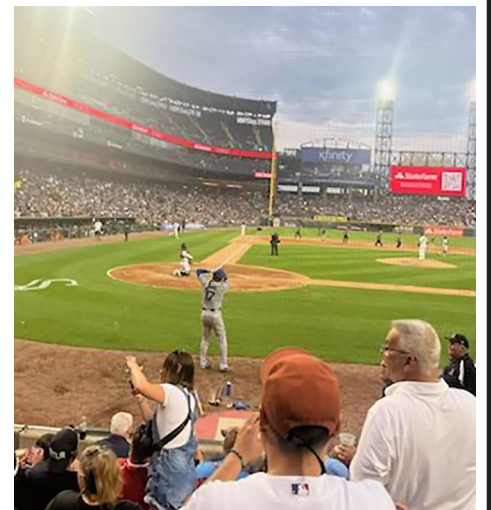
The trend of all-you-can-eat seats, now in a third of parks, offers value—and potential diet disaster. A hot dog combo is cheaper and healthier: Franks

have about 320 calories; fewer when they're kosher.

• Root for the Farm Team

All 30 major league stadiums serve up vegetarian options, some offer vegan, and a handful sell whole-if-slightly-pricey fresh fruit and veggies. Whatever the score, you can head home a winner.

THIS DAY IN HISTORY APRIL 15, 1894

Bessie Smith is born in Chattanooga, Tennessee

American singer and Blues great Bessie Smith, a monumental figure in her own time and beyond, was likely born on April 15, 1894 in Chattanooga, Tennessee. At least, that is the date



that appeared on her 1923 application for a marriage license, according to biographer Chris Albertson. Her actual birthday may never be verified.

Despite the immense influence her records had on the shape and course of American popular music in the 20th century, the recorded legacy of Bessie Smith only captures part of her historical significance. Her first recording, "Downhearted Blues" (1923) sold a then-astonishing 800,000 copies, and her subsequent Columbia Records releases throughout the 1920s earned her the title "Empress of the Blues" and influenced countless important musicians in the decades that followed. But by the time Bessie Smith made her first record, she was already a seasoned show-business veteran—an actress, dancer, singer, all-around force of nature and, eventually, the highest-paid African American performer in the world, by many accounts.

Orphaned at the age of nine and raised by her older sisters and brothers, Bessie Smith began singing and dancing for money on the streets of Chattanooga while she was still a young girl. She was 10 when her oldest brother, Clarence, ran off with a

traveling vaudeville troupe, and she was 18 when that same troupe returned to Chattanooga in 1912 and took her on as a dancer. Eight years of showbiz training alongside that

troupe's legendary singer, Ma Rainey, isn't what gave Bessie Smith her equally legendary voice, but it did turn her into an all-around performer ready to headline her own traveling show. Smith was becoming the top draw on the Black vaudeville circuit just as her first recordings reached the public, and though she received little or no royalties from any of her hit records, their popularity helped fill seats on the live tours that made her the wealthiest African American female performer of her day.

The Empress of the Blues was also known for her rather colorful personality and lifestyle. She once survived a stabbing after a performance in her hometown of Chattanooga, chasing after her attacker with the knife still in her chest, then getting herself to the hospital and still not missing the next night's show. She had an extremely tumultuous off-and-on-again marriage, and was known to get into fistfights over lovers of both sexes.

Bessie Smith, who was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1989 as an "early influencer," died at the age of 43 on September 26, 1937.

The American Diabetes Association Collaborates with CVS Health Foundation to Improve Maternal Health Outcomes

CVS Health Foundation's \$500,000 grant will help bridge critical gaps in care navigation for the New York City community

The American Diabetes Association® (ADA) and the CVS Health Foundation have joined forces in a new collaboration that focuses on improving maternal health outcomes and addressing the gaps in care navigation for women with gestational diabetes (GDM) in New York City.

The new \$500,000 funding from the CVS Health Foundation will bolster maternal health services for organizations that are a part of the ADA's Women's Health Initiative, like the Wyckoff Heights Medical Center, to support their patients in Brooklyn and Queens. Ralph Ruggiero, MD, FACOG, FACS, chairman and residency program director, Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology at Wyckoff Heights Medical Center, shared, "We are excited about participating in this next phase of the ADA's Women's Health Initiative, supported by the CVS Health Foundation, where we will focus our work on strengthening prenatal screening and referral for the

people we serve who are at high risk for or have been diagnosed with GDM. This program will also enable our community health workers and doulas to reach deeper into our

community to support patient navigation and promote the importance of postpartum screenings and treatment."

Approximately 50% of women diagnosed with GDM will go on to develop type 2 diabetes. The new funding from the CVS Health Foundation will enable the ADA to expand its programming with health care systems in New York City to improve outcomes. As part of this project, ADA has also engaged the support of the Clinical Directors Network, Inc. (CDN). CDN is a New York-based not-for-profit clinician membership organization, practice-based research network (PBRN), and clinician training organization, founded to provide peer-initiated activities for clinicians practicing in low income, minority, and other underserved communities. This expansion will include increasing access to early GDM screenings and follow-up care and screenings, simplifying the complex care navigation process through a robust referral system, and strengthening the workforce supporting this effort, including community health workers and doulas.

"While gestational diabetes affects up to 9% of pregnancies in the U.S., its incidence and impacts are not distributed equally," said Charles "Chuck" Henderson, chief executive officer of the ADA. "The collaboration with the CVS Health Foundation opens the door for additional screening, education, and outreach to improve outcomes for women with gestational diabetes, particularly women of color, both prenatal and postnatal."

Mothers with GDM have a higher risk during pregnancy of high blood pressure, preeclampsia, and postpartum hemorrhage, and have an increased risk of developing type 2 diabetes (8- to 10 times the risk compared to women without GDM) after pregnancy. In America, Black and Hispanic women are up to two times more likely than white women to have GDM and to experience associated pregnancy or postpartum complications.

"Our unwavering commitment to women's health is the driving force behind our efforts to support organizations working to ensure equitable access to maternal health services in our communities," said Sheryl Burke, senior vice president of corporate social responsibility and chief sustainability officer at CVS Health. "Through our collaboration with the ADA and the health care providers within the program, we will significantly increase access to maternal health services and educational resources for the New York City community."

The learnings from New York City will allow the ADA

to demonstrate improved outcomes in GDM screening and reduced disparities in care to create a model for future growth and replication in other communities.

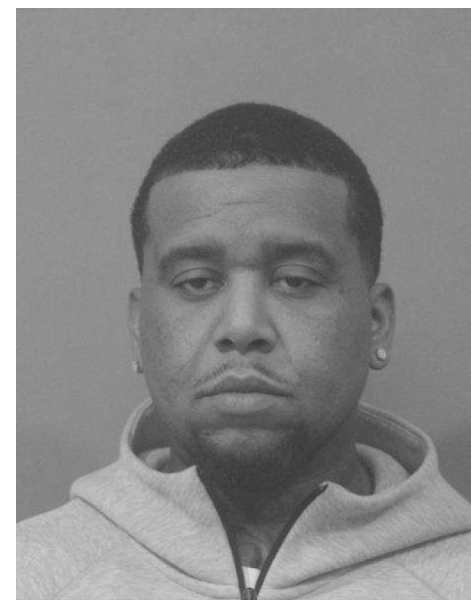
